Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I am hurriedly rushing these thoughts to you as I prepare for my vacation this year. I will be/was gone from August 10th till the end of the month.

This year's vacation will be another one of my favorite things to do, a "road trip." I love the travel, the solitude, the visits with dear people and wonderful places, and the time to pray in a very special way.

And that is precisely what I want to mention to you this month; prayer in very special ways. People come to me in the front office often and ask "do you have a prayer for their specific intention or concern such as, a prayer for passing a test, or a prayer for finding work, or a prayer for some kind of holy longing.

First as I've already inferred, one of my favorites is "Driving down the highway prayer," or then consider "Big time sittin' around prayer" - on the porch, or along the lakefront, or with a dog or a kitty in the yard. Then one way that I dearly I love to pray at this time of the year is "on your knees pulling weeds prayer" which I see as the perfect blend of the active and contemplative way of life with the good result of a well-tended garden body and soul.

Some other ideas for you are "rockin' babies prayer," or "soaking in the tub prayer" or "ironing prayer" or "if you must, using words prayer." Before I go I want to offer my deep appreciation for all of those good Franciscan folks who participated in our recent regional celebration of the Portiuncula, especially Fr. Ed Shea, ofm and Fr. James Hwang, ofm. And most especially I wish to thank all of you who brought food items for our ethnically diverse pot-luck luncheon which I thought was marvelous.

Shepherd me O God, beyond my wants, beyond my fears, from death into life... Formation by Sandra Kisel ofs

What's happening in us and around us right now? What are some of the struggles we're facing and how are we handling them? Where is God in our life...do we make Him take a back seat while we take control? What priority do we give Him over the everyday things that happen to us and our wants? Do we allow Him to be an integral part of the ball game called life? *It's in the everyday struggles we face that we find God and learn wisdom and all the virtues. This going into the temple with God, listening, reflecting, loving and being loved is what we carry out into the world. It's where we're formed!*

What we experience inwardly through our relationship with and in the Trinity; with our Father, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, flows through us into the world, and makes Christ visible. Is God at the center of our activity or are we just busy trying to get it over with so we can move onto the next project on our To-do list? Do we even sometimes try to envision Christ or Mary as we accomplish what we do and tell them, *"I love you!" "Thanks for being with me!" "I need you" and "Wow! Am I lost without You!"*

Remember God is always reaching toward us, to embrace us, love us, to strengthen and guide us. Are we open to His presence, to His Spirit in prayer; in our activities, in cooking, cleaning, in the workshop and our place of employment? Do we thank Him for the embraces and little surprises He gifts us with as we fulfill our obligations? *Being Franciscan is our life*, a life formed from frequent reading of the Gospels, our Rule of Life and the Constitutions and statutes and reading the lives of other Franciscan saints. *If we are to be instruments for building up the Church (the Mystical Body of Christ), then we must continually be building up our spirituality through prayer, Holy Mass, and holy reading.*

This month we continue to celebrate feasts of our Blessed Mother; her birth, her Holy Name and The Feast of the Holy Rosary. Mary was always open to the Holy Spirit moving within her, speaking to her, directing her in the Will of God. Everything Mary did was in contemplation of the Blessed Trinity, whether she was working, reading Holy Scripture, listening to her Son, preparing dinner for the Holy Family, presenting Jesus to the Jews and Gentiles and all nations, teaching, and, well, all the things we do daily.

Lately I've read some of the life of Blessed Duns Scotus, who had a learning disability in his youth. He wanted so much to immerse himself in the truths of the faith but his mind wouldn't cooperate. With prayers and tears he had recourse to Mary for help, as many great saints have done in the past. Mary consoled him;

"She would heal his mental deficiency and help him with all the riches of her Son-not through any merit of his but through a heavenly gift..."

In Paris great Masters such as Fr. Alexander Hales, St. Bonaventure and St. Thomas Aquinas all had taught that Our Lady contracted original sin, even if for just an instant, so as to be redeemed by her Son. Prior to defending his position before the academic faculty of his day, Duns Scotus prayed before a statue of our Lady, *"Allow me to praise you, O most Holy Virgin; give me strength against your enemies."*

In 1993 Pope John Paul 11 dubbed him *"the Minstrel of the Word Incarnate" and "Defender of Mary's Immaculate Conception!"* I hope many of you will take time to read of the tremendous gifts the Church has received through his littleness, Mary's intercession and the all loving goodness and generosity of God.

Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) Our Secular Franciscan Rule in Action

Last year, a member of my fraternity in South Carolina invited me to the first national JPIC Rally in Belleville, IL. I was happy to share this experience with my friend, DorothyAnn who had guided me through my formation journey. It had been just four months earlier that I made my profession to the Secular Franciscan Order – one week before my move to Chicago. I didn't know much about JPIC except that it stood for Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation but I was eager to discover the National Shrine of Our Lady of the Snows and to visit my friend. What I discovered was far beyond my expectations. It was a faith-filled experience that celebrated and cultivated the importance of relationships. It brought together some forty participants who were as diverse as the issues that JPIC addresses. We shared ways to strengthen our relationship to God, to others and to our environment. We learned that with Franciscan joy, relationships cultivate possibilities. Fr. Pio Jackson, OFM, our keynote speaker, explained that "JPIC is part of our life...It's the DNA of our Franciscan life, of our Franciscan spirituality."

Although I was truly inspired by the weekend, I returned home with uncertainty of what JPIC meant to me and to my new fraternity. The scope of issues and needs was a bit overwhelming for me as I settled into my new life here. Nonetheless, a seed of awareness was planted in my heart. A few months later, I accepted a new role as formation director of my fraternity and set aside my JPIC experience. I felt that this is where I can best serve my fraternity based on my teaching experience as a school librarian. Yet, a call to action was still nudging at my heart.

When I was asked to consider the JPIC councilor position for our region, I knew that the Holy Spirit had been nurturing the seed of awareness that was planted a year before. The doubt was still there as was the question of what does JPIC mean to me. To help me discern this call, I contacted my friend. DorothyAnn's first response was "Remember that JPIC is simply our Rule in action." So this is how I would like to address the role of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation in our region. My wish is to increase your awareness of the various ways in which we can assist the "spirit of Assisi to flourish" in our region. Father Pio reminded us that JPIC "proceeds from the spirit...It's Gospel-centered... We're not against something. We're for love, for peace, for joy." At the Rally, we were encouraged to go beyond a "learn and pray" mode to one that is more action driven. This Pray, Learn, Act and Give approach is how I will address topics of concern. Some of these topics may be of interest to you and others may make you feel overwhelmed or even uncomfortable. You may ask yourself, "What difference could I possibly make. This issue is too much for one person to tackle." At this point, remember that JPIC is about building relationships and relationships cultivate possibilities.

These possibilities may include choices you make individually or perhaps with a few members of your fraternity. Once an interest is developed, it may spread to building relationships with other interested Franciscans within our region. The possibilities may grow even further by cultivating relationships with others in our local parishes, dioceses and civic communities. It just starts with a seed planted in your heart and allowing the Holy Spirit to nurture its growth.

Let's imagine the possibilities of building good relationships with others as we seek ways to promote justice, peace and caring for God's gift of creation.

"Let them individually and collectively be in the forefront in promoting justice by the testimony of their human lives and their courageous initiatives. Especially in the field of public life, they should make definite choices in harmony with their faith."
