Minister's Message

Dear sisters and brothers, Here we are, starting March with Ash Wednesday. I feel as if we've already had more than enough penance after this long, cold, snowy winter! In any event, the coming of Lent is certainly a sign that spring is finally on its way, and I think we are all more than ready.

I've written before about the challenges that Lent poses for me, with the tradition of choosing a penance. God knows me and my difficulties in choosing something meaningful and sufficiently challenging. (One year I gave up mayonnaise — that was a trial.) As I've shared in previous years, God has a tendency of providing a penance for me, whether right at the season of Lent or some other time.

I like to think I'm solidly in the Franciscan tradition in considering Lent to be a time to form some new positive habits. It's better to give up a bad habit for six weeks (which can be long enough to make the change permanent) than to give up chocolate (guaranteed to be only for six weeks!). Of course, we always have the spiritual and corporal works of mercy held up as opportunities for improvement. (Sometimes it seems easier to give up sweets...)

Our Candidates Retreat this year is based in part on Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, The Joy of the Gospel. Doesn't that sound like something our father Francis would have been talking about all the time, the JOY of the Gospel? I think it would be great if all of us Secular Franciscans in Mother Cabrini Regional Fraternity could read at least part of *Evangelii Gaudium* this Lent – maybe with our Rule open and readily at hand as well. Printed copies are available at religious bookstores, including the

one at St. Peter's in the Loop (mention you are a Secular Franciscan), and of course from websites like Amazon.com. It is also available for free from the Vatican website. There are at least two versions available there:

http://www.vatican.va/evangeliigaudium/en/, which is a "flip book" version that simulates the experience of reading the printed version on your computer screen;

http://www.vatican.va/holy_father/francesc o/apost_exhortations/documents/papafrancesco_esortazioneap_20131124_evangelii-gaudium_en.html, which is a more typical "8 ½ x 11" format (print preview shows 64 pages, so be prepared for printing to take quite a while).

I will be reading it myself this Lent, so I'm not going to comment on the content now, but instead simply encourage you to join me in this shared Lenten "penance" (which I think will be a happy one).

This is by no means the first papal document that sounds like an expanded version of our Rule. Soon-to-be-saint John Paul II's apostolic letter *Novo Millennio Ineunte* contains many exhortations that parallel our Rule. This is hardly surprising, since Francis himself set out to be a more faithful follower of Christ, not to be something other than the best Catholic he could be. As we follow Christ in the manner of Francis and Clare, let's use these inspiring words provided us by our Holy Fathers to help us live the Gospel way of life we have professed ever more deeply.

Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC)

"Lent: A Time for Reflection"

The mission of JPIC is to assist Professed Secular Franciscans as they reflect on their relationship with God as manifested in the fruits of conversion in their lives. This with special regard to the daily choices made in the areas of justice, peace making and respect for all created things and people; as brothers and sisters of penance, bringing life to the Gospel and the Gospel to life.

- Mission Statement for JPIC

In December, I mentioned that Mary Lopata, our region's representative for the Franciscan Action Network (FAN) and I met to discuss the role of JPIC in our region. We have since designed a preliminary survey that will help us assess the current activities, interests and resources used by our regional members that relate to JPIC issues. This survey will be sent to all fraternity ministers and we ask that you prayerfully consider this and return it promptly so we can share the results.

Our goal is to create a network of resources, contacts and formation ideas to assist those in our area who would like to get involved. Individuals who want to convey their own interests or activities that are outside their fraternity's responses may also complete this survey. We would like to celebrate the good works of our Franciscan family and to build on this foundation in order to strengthen our Franciscan voice.

I revisited the JPIC section of the For Up to Now (FUN) Manual as inspiration for the survey. Pat Brandwein-Ball, OFS beautifully describes how Gospel living and Catholic Social Teaching go hand in hand throughout the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order. The seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching are the foundation of the Franciscan Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation concerns.

It is on these themes that our survey is based. Pat points out that within the Catechism of the Catholic Church, all of Part Three explains Catholic Social Teaching and highly recommends that we spend some time reading it.

I was inspired by her suggestion that Lent would be a good time to read and reflect on these teachings.

The following reflection questions are found in the manual.

- How do the themes of social justice impact my Secular Franciscan vocation?
- How do they call me to conversion?
- What is the Church asking of me as my part in her mission?
- What action am I called to undertake?
- In what way does my apostolic work reflect my relationship with God?

Let us bring life to the Gospel...
