Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Your new Regional Executive Council had its first meeting on January 13. I cannot tell you how blessed we are to have such a wonderful—and talented—team serving our Region! Expect great things from this Council! We had many preliminary issues to address and I'd like to fill you in on the important ones:

Updated 2007 Regional Calendar. The first day of the Candidates' Retreat was changed to April 14 (the week after Easter), and the *location* (not dates) of the Quinquennial Congress has changed—see page 4 for the complete Regional calendar.

Per Capita. Letters will be going out to the ministers of the Region shortly. As the ministers will recall, it was voted at our Chapter of Ministers last May to increase

the *Per Capita* to \$25 per *Professed* member. In addition, it will no longer be possible for the Region to waive its portion of the *Per Capita* in hardship cases; helping those individuals will be the responsibility of their local fraternities.

Apostolates Workshop. The Regional Apostolates Workshop is scheduled for Saturday, March 10 at Mayslake Village (see article on page 2).

Franciscan Family Structure for National Action. This is a very important event in which all branches of the Franciscan Family in the U.S. will come together to "bring a more visible and effective Franciscan presence to the effort of repairing relationships to establish justice in our world." SFO Regions have been invited to

Spiritual Assistant's Message

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Wow, it seems like we just celebrated Christmas and New Year, and now all of a sudden we're looking at ... yes, you guessed it, *Lent*. I mean, I still see Christmas lights up on houses in my neighborhood, keeping the memories fresh. Not long ago I received one more Christmas card, which had made a rather zig-zaggy journey, but finally reached my home.

And our colors, at least the liturgical ones, have gone from white to green, and now are soon going to turn to purple. Actually, purple is a very beautiful color, the favorite color of one of my best friends. But it is presented to us as a color of penance. I really don't know how that fits. Are we supposed to fast till we turn purple? What exactly has purple to do with penance?

Well, anyway, I suppose it's more subdued than, say, white.

So, Lent is a time for us to do penance. As you must know, the early name for the lay folks' branch of the Franciscan Order was the Order of Penance. In *A Book of the Praises of Saint Francis*, written by Bernard of Besse around 1277–83, we read:

"The Third Order is of the Brothers and Sisters of Penance, shared by clerics, laity, virgins, widows, and married couples. Their purpose is to live uprightly in their own homes, to devote their attention to works of piety, and to flee the world's allurements. Therefore, you might see among them nobles, and even knights and other people great in the world's estimation, dressed in proper cloaks of black fur, humble in both their clothing and mounts, so modestly associating

Secular Franciscans Should Be Prophets

This is the key point of the intervention of Fr. José Carballo, OFM during the pastoral visit to the CIOFS Presidency.

Formation is the pillar of our refoundation. Re-foundation means that it is important to go to our origin and rediscover our roots, the essential charismatic elements. What counts is the quality of life. We are Franciscans insofar as we live our project of life. If we do not live it, we do nothing.

What are the consequences of this refoundation?

Accepting our condition of minority. We should be happy about what we are. We must not compete with others. All of us are called to be "minors" in our society.

Giving priority to the quality rather than quantity of life.

Privileging the symbolic aspect rather than effectiveness. It is a temptation to put effectiveness above fraternity. We must put the renewal of the Order before survival. The Church does not need survivors, but living people.

Who can take on this journey? THE PROPHET: he has five characteristic features:

A great memory. A population

future. Without history the SFO family will have neither present nor future. We must purify our history by living the elements; we must have the courage to say, "This is our history".

His attention is focused on reality, listening simultaneously to the Lord and to the people. We must always hold in our hands both the Bible and the newspaper to be aware of reality. The Holy Father in his Encyclical, *Novo* Millennio Advente, invites us to have memory and prophecy to "foresee the future". We too must foresee the future, like Francis, who always looked ahead. By listening a lot it will be possible for us to have a vision of the future.

A great love for people, which will allow us to live the present passionately. "Look at the past gratefully and live the present passionately" (John Paul II). A Franciscan must have the passion of Francis who, like Clare, was passionately in love with Jesus Christ and said "love is not loved". The Scripture is very strongly based against those who are "tepid/lukewarm".

Faith and courage. A lot of faith because we know we are not alone. We

without history has neither present nor must recuperate the faith in the Spirit. St. Francis is the first charismatic. He was the man "who moved the Spirit" We must recuperate the faith in the Lord of History. Today's crisis is the crisis of faith. It is faith that gives us the courage to face events. The prophet has courage. He loves the Church profoundly and is critical at the same time. If we don't have courage we should question ourselves about our faith.

> **Great patience.** Be willing to be rejected. We must go ahead knowing that it is not easy. We must not leave for tomorrow what we can do today, considering that no prophet died in his bed. Refusal is part of prophetical vocation. When one accepts to be a prophet, one must accept refusal, like Christ accepted death.

Now we must deepen the sense of our centenary as well as the centenary of St. Elizabeth. We cannot let these moments of grace go by; we cannot restrict ourselves to having a nice congress or making a beautiful publication. We must take action. There is a lot [of] inaction in our family. We are an army. We are the world's largest spiritual family. But what do we do?

with the indigent, that you would not doubt they are truly God-fearing." (from *Francis of Assisi: Early Documents*, Vol. III, "The Prophet", p. 64)

And Henri D'Avranches in *The Versified Life of Saint Francis* (probably written after 1283) also gave testimony to the penitential holiness of those early members of the Order of Penance:

"But because discernment makes for wholeness in a holy proposal, it is into three Orders he gathered all those converted. One Order got its name from the penance its members practiced: In it both sexes and every state of life were retained, cleric and lay person, man, woman, married and single. Nor did one have to change one's home; in one's own each one knew what rules of life to observe, what was to be carried out. Already this Order's adherents radiate miracles. Which goes to show how great in the Lord's eyes is its status." (*Francis of Assisi*, p. 91)

We are all well aware of how much St. Francis loved penance. In his writings he spoke of observing several "lents" each year. One particular year he decided to observe the primary Lent that prepares for the celebration of Christ's Resurrection in a special way. He spent it on the island in Lake Trasimene, taking with him only a loaf or two of bread.

Wow, that's real penance! We are not expected to do anything like that. But Francis does remind us of our calling, and of the fact that if all of our life is to be characterized by penance, then Lent is especially the time for it.

While we have a great deal of latitude in choosing our own Lenten penances, freedom can be a stumbling block. Does our freedom result in choosing the easiest kind of penances, or even choosing not to choose? Whatever penance we choose to embrace during Lent, it ought to be meaningful, something that addresses our particular struggle to "turn away from sin and be faithful to the gospel," as we hear when the ashes are imposed on our heads.

Dear sisters and brothers, let us make a really holy Lent this year that we may celebrate a glorious Easter. May God bless you abundantly.
