"Francis, Build Up My Church ..."

"I (am) the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give a gift from the spring of life-giving water." (Rev 21:6)

It is only through our renewed awareness of who we are and our determination to act as genuine Franciscans that "the Seraphic family as a whole will shine forth in its true brilliance as a living Word of Christ, as the Poverello and his first followers did in their day". (English-Speaking Conference of the Order of Friars Minor, *I Have Done My Part; May Christ Teach You Yours.*)

St. Clare continually speaks to us of being mirrors of Jesus Christ in the world. In our daily examines, do we reflect Jesus in our acts, words, lives? Do people identify the Holy Trinity as the bedrock of all we are, say, and do and that all that flows forth from us stems from our loving, living *relationship* with God? God within us, *the beginning and the end*, the first and the last cause of everything we do? Is He the beginning and the end and the first cause of everything we do?

If not and if we truly have hopes of making genuine contributions and changes in this world, then conversion must first take place within us as it did Francis. We must seek Jesus to know, listen to, and respond to Him. We need to get out of our heads and into our hearts where God must reign. If we truly want to make a difference in the world, not only our outward image must be changed but, *most certainly*, our inner selves.

"Jesus Christ, 'Image of the invisible God' (Col 1:15), clothed with humanity and freely reduced to the condition of a servant (cf. Phil 2:6-8), became for Francis the model for

all human behavior and the norm for every human decision, whether individual or social. ...[T]he people to whom Francis preached were captivated by this intensely personal approach to God; they too began to rediscover the Lord as their closest and most faithful friend; Emmanuel living in the midst of his people like a shepherd among his beloved sheep." (*I Have Done My Part*)

"Francis proclaimed insistently that Mary, the Mother of Jesus, 'had made the Lord of Majesty to be our Brother' (2 Cel 198). ... Francis himself had experienced, and was able to present to others, a living God, a God who lived in the midst of his people and shared with them human hopes, joys and sufferings (cf. Jn1:14)". (*ibid.*)

Are we fully aware of our calling as followers of Francis? Do we continually come to the fountain to renew our determination to act as *genuine* Franciscans? "It was in the Eucharist, ... that [Francis] saw our Lord, Jesus Christ 'filling everybody ... worthy of Him' (EpOrd 40-Letter to a General Chapter and to All the Friars)". (*ibid.*)

"The motivation for our actions is love. True love shows itself in ordinary things. True love shows itself in ordinary things. We listen to a hurting friend; we walk with someone in depression; we act justly in business; we forgive people who hurt us; we seek justice for oppressed people; we work to lift the burden of poverty ... About the Retreat Master

Fr. Benet Fonck, OFM is the Coordinator of Communications for the Sacred Heart Province of the Order of Friars Minor. In this capacity, he writes a weekly newsletter, prepares news releases and obituary notices, publishes a quarterly journal, and soon will be the manager of the Province’s web site, www.thefriars.org.

Previously, Fr. Fonck worked for 32 years in the area of spiritual assistance for the Secular Franciscan Order and was involved with updating the *SFO Ritual*, providing commentaries for the new *Rule* and *General Constitutions*, and facilitating a deeper commitment to spiritual life, community participation, and apostolic endeavors in the SFO. From 1980-1985, he served as a delegate of the Franciscan Superior General for all Secular Franciscans worldwide. A prolific author and translator, Fr. Fonck wrote extensively for the former *Franciscan Herald Magazine* and his books include *Fully Mature with the Fullness of Christ*, and *To Cling with All Her Heart to Him: The Spirituality of St. Clare*. He has translated a life of St. Francis of Assisi from Italian by Gianmaria Polidoro, OFM and is collaborating on a text of liturgies and prayer formats to be used by Secular Franciscans.

Born in 1945, Fr. Fonck entered the Order of Friars minor in 1965 and was ordained a priest in 1972. He holds a bachelor of philosophy degree from Quincy University (Quincy, IL), a master of arts in theology from DePaul University (Chicago), a master of divinity degree from Chicago’s Catholic Theological Union, and a degree in journalism from Marquette University (Milwaukee). He served as parochial vicar for two parishes and as the pastor of St. Anthony of Padua Parish in St. Louis (MO) for four years. A popular retreat master, Fr. Fonck has given retreats, workshops, and seminars for Secular Franciscans and for Franciscan religious; presented days of recollection to various church-based groups; and facilitated several parish missions and renewals. ■

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and intense. In reviewing the eight presentations, which are available on www.nafra-sfo.org along with all the other workshop materials, it's amazing how much was covered in such a short time. Our National Formation Director, Bob Fitzsimmons, SFO, gave the presentations; following are my notes:

- *Introduction and thought questions; what image of God do you hold fast to?* Our images of God have an important effect on our relationships with God; if one sees God as a powerful deity, demanding perfection and judging and punishing those who don't measure up, that relationship will be far different from one who sees God as all-loving and forgiving.
- *It all begins: 1209 Propositum Vitae – The Life Project.* Propositum Vitae was the first Rule for the Friars, an oral rule, basically a few lines of Scripture: "...sell what you possess and give to the poor; ...take up your cross and follow me."
- *The Primary (Dominican) and Alternative (Franciscan) View of our Catholic Theology.* Primary Catholic theology says if there had been no original sin, Jesus would not have come. This is based on the theology of original sin (St. Augustine), the Doctrine of Atonement (St. Anselm) and the Dominican Tradition, mainly as articulated by St. Thomas Aquinas. Alternative Catholic Theology, which is now also accepted, says that even if there had been no original sin, Jesus would still have come; that the Incarnation was always part of God's plan because God loves us so much. Primary and monastic spirituality sees us seeking to leave the world to ascend to union with the Divine. Alternative/Franciscan spirituality sees God descending out of love to us and all creation through the Incarnation.
- *Clare of Assisi.* St. Clare, although monastic, did not follow a monastic spirituality. She emphasized the Incarnation as the starting point of spirituality, the goodness of creation, and that God cannot be found apart from the world. Everything that exists is dependent on and uniquely loved by the Father and called into relationship with the Holy Trinity.
- *Bonaventure's Gift.* His gift was an appreciation and better understanding of the Holy Trinity.

- *Bl. John Duns Scotus and Franciscan Spirituality.* Bl. John Duns Scotus explained that the Incarnation is not a divine afterthought or reaction to any event (i.e., original sin) but is the cornerstone of the whole plan of creation: everything that was, is, and ever will be is based in Christ.
- *To Be Eucharist.* Eucharist is for Francis the final act of God's [Jesus] self-emptying, to be physically present in the lowest, poorest, humblest manner of food. This is our model for imitation.
- *Re-founding the Legacy: Gospel to Life and Back Again – Secular Spirituality.* Francis models the essential conditions for living a penitential life: a complete turning to God; loving one's neighbor as oneself; acknowledging and despising one's personal tendency to sin; receiving Eucharist devoutly; and allowing God's Spirit to dwell in us. This is surely "going from Gospel to life, and from life to Gospel."

Vinal Van Benthem, SFO presented the prayer services and encouraged dialog on various aspects of Bob's presentations, and she shared a Trinitarian hymn, "Everyday God", composed by Bernadette Farrell, which is available on the *Restless is the Heart* CD.

■ **Regional Retreat.** The registration forms have gone out for our retreat, and the theme, "Fire Burning in My Heart", sounds really great. Hope to see all of you there! See the article on page 3 for full details, as well as our web site, www.ilsfo.org.
