Minister's Message

Dear brothers and sisters,

Happy 2012! It's time to think about what we're going to do differently in the year ahead. I'm not into New Year's resolutions myself. The way they're normally worded, it's no surprise they get discarded as soon as the first unavoidable exception happens. All or nothing is unrealistic, and it doesn't match our Franciscan way of life, either. Our call to daily conversion means that we aren't claiming we can exercise every day this year, or never make another unkind remark...only that we will set out today to do our best to do what we think is God's will for us, and try again tomorrow.

Having said that, it's quite a different matter to set goals for the year (or the month, or the week – whatever time scale works for you). Goals make it possible for us to recognize the actions we must take NOW in order to make the goal possible later. If you want to run a marathon in October, you have to start training months in advance. If you are thinking of a career change, researching possibilities, going back to school, rearranging your finances, even moving to another city may be necessary steps in the process. Without thinking about what could be, and the gap between what COULD be and what IS, nothing is likely to change.

I think we should all consider having a goal for spiritual growth as part of our life plans. Unfortunately, "Become a better Secular Franciscan" isn't a goal that makes it clear what must be done to achieve it. At work, we talk about SMART goals - Specific, Measurable, Attainable, <u>R</u>ealistic, and <u>T</u>imely. These characteristics are helpful in setting any kind of goal. One possibility for 2012 would be, "Increase my appreciation for the SFO as a worldwide Order by getting to know at least one Secular Franciscan from somewhere other than the Mother Cabrini Regional Fraternity." To achieve this, all you have to do is participate in the Quinquennial Congress, here in Chicago, and mingle with the hundreds of other Secular Franciscans who will be coming here.

There are many other goals you could set for the year that could be achieved, in part, by attending the "Q": renewed enthusiasm for the

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Secular Franciscan vocation, learning more about what it means to be a Secular Franciscan in the world today, having a great vacation without leaving town, celebrating the Fourth of July with hundreds of brothers and sisters ... you get the idea. Registration is open – sign up as soon as you can and save some money in the process!

While I will be delighted to see as many of you as possible at the "Q", that isn't the only action I'd like you to consider for 2012. Please consider a goal of service to your brothers and sisters in fraternity. Nine of our 24 local fraternities AND our regional fraternity have elections this year, and even in fraternities that aren't having elections, there are always new opportunities to help out. We owe our elected leaders the opportunity to step out of those roles; we owe ourselves the opportunity to grow. It's like geese flying in formation (or cyclists riding in a pace line); the leader works the hardest, then he or she drops to the back and the next in line takes the lead for a while. If you are asked to consider serving on your fraternity council, please think of how you could say yes, not all the (perfectly valid) reasons you could say no. Service to your fraternity is another action toward better living the Gospel life (and, I assure you, provides its share of opportunities for daily conversion, along with many joys).

These are actions which require planning and preparation (saving money, a realistic assessment of our time commitments, etc.), but at the same time they require being open to the work of the Holy Spirit. Remember that the Spirit works through those we encounter and especially through our brothers and sisters in fraternity. When you are invited to step up and do something new, consider that it may well be God who is really calling you. We can't grow without taking some risks and giving God an opportunity to surprise us.

No matter what challenges confront us this year, may we face them with the peace that comes from the sure knowledge of God's unconditional love for us. May the heartknowledge of that love transform each of us as it did our blessed father Francis!

SFO Pilgrimage to the Holy Land – October 18-27, 2012 with Fr Chuck Faso, OFM

My name is Fr Chuck Faso OFM. I am the Spiritual Assistant for the St Francis Fraternity of Crystal Lake, IL. I invite the Secular Franciscans of the Mother Cabrini Region to come with me to the Holy Land for ten days in October 2012.

We will reflect on our Franciscan Spirituality as we celebrate mass in Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jerusalem, Capernaum, and in the Holy Sepulcher.

We will renew our Baptismal vows in the Jordan River and our Profession on Mt Tabor.

We will carry the Cross as we pray the Stations of the Cross through the streets of Jerusalem. Our bus ride to the lowest spot on the earth will take us to Jericho, to Masada and to Qumran where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. We will meet other Franciscans – men and women, religious and lay.

We will reflect on the 1978 Rule where we read: "They are called to follow Christ in the footsteps of Saint Francis of Assisi... By their profession they pledge themselves to live the gospel... The rule and life of the Secular Franciscans is this: to observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ... Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to gospel..." One way to carefully read the Gospel is to walk in the footprints of Jesus in the land where he was born, preached, died and rose for us.

Since I joined the Franciscan Order in 1960 and was ordained a priest in 1967, I have taught in our seminaries, ministered at St Peter's in the Loop for twenty years, preached retreats since 1998. In 1980 I led my first of thirty-two pilgrimages to the Holy Land.

Come to Land called Holy. Let's read, hear, and understand the Gospel in a deeper, Franciscan way!

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JPIC News – Dwelling Among Us Gloria Huerta, SFO

As we begin a New Year, the following article would be a great reflection on how we may welcome God and others into our hearts and homes over the days and months ahead.

The readings the Fourth (and last) Sunday of Advent offered two images of a dwelling place for God. David, with good intentions, wants to do a "home improvement" for the "ark of God," building a house of cedar to replace the tent, but God sees otherwise (cf. 2 Sm 7:5). It is among the people that God will establish a house and kingdom that "shall endure forever" (2 Sm 7:13). And when the time comes, the Word made Flesh seeks and finds a dwelling in the womb of a young Jewish girl (cf. Lk 1:26-38). Over and over the scriptures remind us that God's ways are not our ways.

The human way often runs counter to God's ways: In a recent newspaper story, a picture of hundreds of people standing in line with umbrellas all through a rainy, chilly night, hoping to be placed on a waiting list for a low-rent apartment; a TV account of an increasing number of children living in cars. These are realities in the most prosperous country in the world. These are not God's ways.

God longs to make a dwelling among us and within us. For a breathless moment, God waits for Mary's "yes" before becoming one of us and finding a home in her womb. Aren't we all home-seekers? Men and women waiting all night in the rain, children sleeping in cars, undocumented immigrants, those of us who live comfortably-all yearn for a place where we are accepted, loved, wanted. Even God desires to find a home in and among us. Even God waits for our "yes".

Perhaps God is asking you to reach out to those without homes. You can say "yes"! Identify a local homeless shelter and volunteer time or give a donation. Search online to find the *60 Minutes segment on "Living in Cars: Homeless Children in Florida.*" Read the Circle of Protection Statement to address poverty and the federal budget, which the USCCB, FAN and many other Christian organizations have signed. If there is an Occupy Home group in your town or city, make a visit and ask people why they spent Christmas in a tent in a public space.
